

# The Harington Scheme



The Harington Scheme affords a unique opportunity for young adults with learning disabilities and/or difficulties, providing individual learning programmes designed to help them into employment, further education or a more rewarding life.

Set up as a charity by the local community some 33 years ago, the majority of learners come from the North London area, though the unusual nature of the scheme attracts people from all over the capital.

The scheme is situated on a land-locked site behind Highgate High Street in North London.

There are four main strands to the training:

- The *Vocational Training Scheme* aims to prepare learners for work, find them further employment and support them in their new jobs. Qualifications and training in horticulture and retail are offered, and the programme is designed as a holistic package that develops transferable skills vital for successful and sustained employment.
- *Harington Gardeners* is a supported employment initiative offering a stepping stone for those learners who are not ready to go straight into work at the end of their training.
- The *Day Service* provision offers horticultural activity of a therapeutic nature to adults with a learning disability or mental health support needs.
- The *Foundation Skills* provision equips young people with the basic skills needed for employment, self-direction and personal development.

Every learner has an individual programme of activities to support their personal development and skill needs.

The majority of learners are found a job or further education when they leave, and the Scheme supports them for as long as is needed for them to settle in.



# Chairs' report



This report covers our activities from 1 August 2012 to 31 July 2013.

We are sad to announce that Caryle Adams, one of our Trustees, died unexpectedly in February, and Dan Newman, a long serving Trustee, resigned in April. Stuart Bull, with a background in marketing, and David Tait, formerly Chair of Thrive and member of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, will be replacing them. Their expertise will be extremely useful to us.

Consequently we start the financial year 2013-14 having recruited five new Trustees in the last three years, a changeover of 41%, which continues to renew the energy and experience of the Trustees.

We are delighted to report a surplus of £41,000 this year, which is due to the generosity of our many donors, and also to the fact we achieved our contract with the Education Funding Agency and no money was clawed back for any shortfall.

At the last AGM we mentioned that the current three year Business Plan would finish in 2014, and we have been working this year with Pilotlight, a group of business leaders who work in teams to help charities to think and plan strategically, to prepare our Business Plan for the next three years from 2014-2017. We have consulted with parents, staff and Trustees to clarify the way forward for the Scheme, in a world still dominated by the continuing uncertainty over the site. Currently we are examining the possibility of going into partnership with other providers in offering a catering or enhanced retail option, but this is still at an early stage.

The Primary Care Trust (PCT) our former landlord, was abolished in March 2013, and the land passed into the control of NHS

Property Services. We are currently negotiating with the new landlords aiming to acquire the freehold at a reasonable price.


We are delighted that the Friends, under their chair Rosalind Laurie, have increased their annual contribution to the Scheme from £14,085 last year to £15,855 this year. This results from their organisation of the annual Supper Quiz in February, hosted by John and Katie Plews from Upstairs at the Gatehouse, the two annual plant sales and refreshments, organised together with the staff, three very successful wine tastings and a cabaret evening with Kara Wilson, which was sold out.

In addition, Pauline Treen, one of our Trustees, organised a very successful Art Sale at the Chocolate Factory in Wood Green in December, and a concert by the Haydn Orchestra in January, which together raised a further £9,352 for the Scheme.





# Manager's report



It's been another successful year at Harington and our learners and assistant gardeners have continued to excel themselves – growing, learning and achieving their goals. The year was very busy, sometimes challenging and seems to have whizzed by, but at this time of year when we take stock and reflect on the outcomes of our work we are reminded that all of the hard work is definitely worthwhile.

In the academic year to 31st July 2013, 84 young people and adults with learning disabilities benefited from the training or support offered by the Harington Scheme's core training provision. In addition to this, 9 pupils from Riverside School in Haringey attended the Harington site one day per week to learn horticultural skills, and a group of 10 learners from Haringey Sixth Form Centre took part in the Harington Gardener's new training initiative at Bruce Youth Centre. 93% of leavers achieved one or more qualifications as part of their training in the same period and 82% of learners who left during the 2012/13 academic year went to a positive destination. Eight learners gained employment at the end of their training, including two Apprenticeships and in addition two former Assistant Gardeners were supported into full-time jobs with the Royal Parks.



The Harington Gardeners had a particularly exciting year with the start of two new projects:

In January the Gardeners were awarded a contract to provide a horticultural training programme at Bruce Grove Youth Centre in Haringey and to "reclaim" the somewhat unloved garden at the centre. The garden transformation began in March with the Harington Gardeners clearing the site, planting a small orchard and building some raised beds, a shed and a polytunnel. The training commenced in June, one day per week, and groups from Haringey Sixth Form Centre and Riverside were given a horticultural taster as well as the

opportunity to contribute to the garden transformation.


The Harington Gardeners' Growing Localities programme funded by the City Bridge Trust also started in the Spring. This two year project has introduced a new programme of structured horticultural training for Gardeners' participants, including the opportunity to gain qualifications, gain work experience and receive job coaching support. Twenty four young people have engaged with the programme to date.

Visitors to the Scheme always comment on how wonderful the gardens look and horticulturally it has been a great year. We have continued to run a produce stall in Pond Square in addition to our Spring and Christmas Sale, with help from the Friends of the Harington Scheme, and our regular customers really enjoyed vegetables, fruits and flowers produced by the learners throughout the year. The learners and staff also began a long term project to re-introduce physic garden style planting to our walled garden, so that it is more representative of its original use as an apothecary's garden in the 17th century.

Fifty-five young people participated in our Horticulture, Retail and Choices Foundation Learning programmes in the academic year 2012-13. Learners and staff celebrated their achievements in July which included: 124 qualifications and 50 work experience placements. The annual Celebration of

Achievements was well attended by learners and their families as well as Harington staff and supporters, and it was wonderful to see so many learners being handed bundles of certificates by the Mayors of Haringey and Islington. Congratulations to all of those learners and especially to those who have moved on to work, college and other activities during the year.

An increase in learning support from the Education Funding Agency allowed us to employ five learning support assistants. They have helped the learners in class, on work experience, and in the gardens to work toward their goals. This extra support has been invaluable to both learners and trainers, and I am pleased to report that we have secured funding to double the number of Learning Support Assistants in 2013/14.

New funding arrangements are now in place allowing us to apply to a learner's home local authority for individual support funding to ensure that all learners are able to participate and fully benefit from the learning programmes on offer. We look forward to strengthening our ties with local authorities over the coming years to make sure that we take a co-ordinated approach in supporting local young people to progress toward their chosen career path.

A major aim of our work is to improve learners' employability and over the years we have developed a bank of very

supportive employers who host work experience for learners. We were very pleased that ten new employers, including the Royal Hospital Chelsea, agreed to host placements for learners and we thank all of the employers that we work with for their continued support.

During the year we welcomed four new members of staff, Joanna Wise (at Bruce Grove) and Learning Support Assistants, Ginny Griffin-Monk, Allison Rowe and Samantha Welsh. We are fortunate to have a very willing, hard-working and caring staff team. Their loyalty good humour and focus on getting the best outcomes really makes a difference in the lives of our learners and



## 2012/13

The Harington Scheme changed its accounting year in 2011/12 to reflect the contracting periods of funding bodies. The accounting period now runs from 1st August to 31st July and the accounts show the position for the period 1 August 2012 to 31 July 2013. The profit and loss account shows that the Scheme returned a surplus of £42,299 on a turnover of £808,804 in 2012/13.

Expenditure in 2012/13 was in line with budget at £766,505.

The restricted funds balance as at the year end is £34,173 as related projects were taken forward. The balance will be carried forward.

The financial results for the Scheme for the year continue the pattern of previous years. The results are dependent on variable income streams and on grants and donations. Learner recruitment and retention during the year was good and the training centre achieved its full Education Funding Agency (EFA) contract value. The Gardeners continue to make losses, but remain an important part of the training. The Scheme is committed to retaining the Gardeners who compete for contracts in the commercial and public sector, and is progressing ways in which the loss can be materially reduced. This year the Gardeners diversified their income by taking on two new training projects with funding from the City Bridge Trust and Haringey Council.

The Scheme's principal funding source was the Education Funding Agency (EFA) which succeeded the Young People's Learning Agency (YPLA) in April 2012. EFA income accounted for over 50% of income (c £448,000). The Scheme is committed to the continual development of the scope and quality of its services to meet the contemporary educational standards and funders' requirements, as it is obviously imperative that government funding is maintained.

Income and fundraising targets have been identified which can be reasonably relied upon and will be sufficient to cover minimum Scheme running costs for the year. The provision of any additional services and improvements will be dependent on further fundraising.





# Friends of Harington report



Although the weather last year was generally grim, I'm happy to say that for the Friends it was sunny in the fund-raising sense, and we were able to transfer £15,855.11 to the Scheme in June. Much of this money came from the donations which many Friends generously added to their £10 subscriptions, especially one magnificent contribution for which we're most grateful! The rest came from our various events, which between them raised several thousand pounds. The official Friends of Harington numbered 215 last year, but we have many more unofficial friends who support our activities. Sadly, some of our members died during the year, and so with the addition of some new Friends our numbers remained almost the same.


The Friends' year is punctuated by three regular fund-raisers. For the staff and learners, the Spring and Christmas Sales are about plants, but for the Friends' committee they're about food, in the form of the home produce and refreshments we sell and the raffle we run, which together produce a refreshing profit of over £1,000

each time. Our chief fund-raiser, however, is the annual Supper Quiz instituted by Leila Hodge, which brightens up our lives in the dull days of February and this time made over £3,000 for the Scheme. We managed to squeeze in 15 tables and a very

jolly time was had by all, thanks to John and Katie Plews' original and entertaining questioning and the delicious wine-fuelled supper which went with it. Another regular Friends' activity is the Pond Square stall, efficiently run by Alison Dart between

March and October with the help of Friends' volunteers, which gives the learners the opportunity to sell the flowers, fruit and vegetables they have helped to grow. As well as raising hundreds of pounds for the Scheme, the stall provides a valuable link with the Highgate community.

In addition to these regular events, the Friends' committee finds a different way each year of raising money. This time it was an entertaining and somewhat risqué Cabaret evening in June, which, thanks to the generosity of star performer Kara Wilson and her husband Tom Conti, at whose lovely Hampstead house the show took place, raised £1,200 for the Harington. We also held two enjoyable and informative wine-tastings this autumn, hosted by the Theatre of Wine and Truffles Delicatessen, for whose friendly and knowledgeable support we are grateful.

The Friends also pay for and run non-fund-raising social events at the Scheme, namely the Bonfire party, the Celebration of Achievements evening and the Staff lunch. When new committee members join us, well-qualified professionals in different fields, it gradually dawns on them that their chief task is to bake. I have always been embarrassed by this, but hope that they've got used to it now and in return have acquired some good new recipes! I'd like to say a huge thank-you to all the current committee for their hard work and support; it would be difficult to find a better team.

We know that all the money we've raised will be put to good use, as currently is our 2012 contribution. As well as paying for the excellent residential trip to the Isle of Wight in September, costing about £7000 but well worth it, we have funded the expensive ICT support necessary to enable the learners to develop their various skills, and also paid for some teaching and training resources. Further expenditure of the Friends' contribution will include new furniture and an ID card machine and its running costs, which was recommended by Ofsted in the interests of learner safety.

The Celebration of Achievements evening in July demonstrated the success of the Scheme in giving training and job opportunities to those for whom little else is on offer. I'm happy that the Friends have contributed to this, and that we have also enabled them to socialise and enjoy themselves in ways not otherwise available to them, which is as important as training for the satisfying and productive lives we all want for them.







## Beneficiaries by Age Group (%)




Above: The actual number of learners in each age category

Above: The percentage of learners from each borough, actual numbers in brackets.






